## Rochester Regional Library Council 2001-2002 Key Accomplishments

Thanks to the cooperative spirit, support, and contributions of all librarians, library staff, libraries and library systems within the RRLC region, we had a very successful year.

The ten “top accomplishments” were:

- Presented 103 Continuing Education programs; 1,650 staff attending, representing 247 libraries; – a 16% increase in libraries represented.
- Improved evaluation score for RRLC Continuing Education programs; increased from 3.4 in 1999 to 3.6 in 2002 (out of a possible 4.0).
- Began a Leadership Institute in partnership with Monroe County Library System: training 40 new library leaders in six-month “Institute”.
- Created a mobile training lab to extend training opportunities to Council members at remote sites and to loan to members for their own training purposes.
- Developed a regional, patron-initiated ILL system for all libraries — URSA.
- Used a variety of grant moneys to purchase equipment and software — ARIEL, ILLiad, Clio, scanners and computers — for libraries to assist with ILL effort.
- Increased by 56% the amount of discounted electronic resource subscriptions through WALDO.
- Developed “CLIC-on-Health” — Community and Library Information Collaboration on Health — in which all types of libraries will work together and with the community to provide quality consumer health information to all the people of the region.
- Distributed \$248,7872 in grant funds directly to libraries.
- Increased participation of members in RRLC programs and services:
  - \* RBDB member projects increased from two to seven.
  - \* 98% of the 62 full, associate, and affiliate member libraries or systems had access to at least one electronic resource through RRLC.
  - \* 63% (285) of all libraries in the region participated in the Shared Database Program – an increase of 11%.
  - \* The number of people participating in RRLC Committees increased by 33% to 200.
  - \* 779 people participate in the RRLC listserv.

## No New Money for Libraries!



How could legislators ignore the fact that 70% of registered voters in New York use the library on a regular basis? In effect that’s what they did by failing to include *any* new money for libraries in the 2002-2003 State Budget. While the Rochester Regional Library Council, the Monroe County Library System and the Pioneer Library System were hoping for at least enough money to implement the 2000 Census, there was *nothing*. Libraries were ignored.

That is not to say that local legislators have ignored specific public libraries in our region. Many local legislators have been very generous with “member items” that benefit one library, and that is commendable.

But people don’t use just one library any longer.

People use libraries online. They can borrow books online; view and print a huge variety of full-text articles from online databases; and follow links to librarian-selected, quality websites.

Teachers and students borrow books from other libraries.

Nurses and doctors need medical information from large medical libraries and the National Library of Medicine.

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I can only speak for myself but over the past couple of weeks I have been feeling a bit anxious about this BiblioBuild project undertaking! I have been spending alot of time worrying about the project. Then I went to 84 Rauber Street on Saturday

morning to deliver our sign...which looks great!...and met Christina, our Mom. She just happened to be there for a landscaping class being offered by one of FCHH's board members.

Upon being introduced, first I held out my hand to shake hers and realized that a hug was what I wanted to give her...and she me. She is just wonderful. She told me that when she heard that the library folks were responsible for her home she raised her hands in thanksgiving because she knows how



much library folks care about people!! She is SOOOOOOOO excited about this. She stops by on her way home from work almost every day just to look at it. Two of her sons were there on Saturday working on a neighbor's house. Remember that she has to work 250 hours on her own home and 250 hours on a neighbors home. Some of those hours can be worked by family members.

She does have 10 children and, yes, they are all hers:) She told me that she was married but is now a single mom. She works at the Family Resource Center and all the employees there are planning on volunteering on Christina's home.



We talked for maybe only 10 minutes before she had to go back to her workshop. But that was enough to take the project "BiblioBuild" out of the abstract and put faces and personalities to it.

## Computers To Go



The Rochester Regional Library Council is proud to announce its newest service to members – a computer lab to go. The “lab” consists of six Dell laptop computers and one Dell laptop instructor workstation, a projection unit, and carrying case. The computers are connected via a wireless network, and come loaded with Windows 2000, Microsoft XP Small Office (Word, Excel, Outlook, and Publisher), Internet Explorer and basic Internet tools.

A library that wants to do computer training for staff or patrons, but doesn't have a lab, now only needs a room with tables, chairs and an Ethernet Internet connection. If you aren't going onto the 'Net, you don't even need the Internet connection!

All RRLC member libraries and members of RRLC member library systems may borrow the “mobile lab” without charge. We do require that staff borrowing the “lab to go” attend a one-hour orientation session at RRLC and also sign a letter of agreement about the use of the lab. Users also must be knowledgeable about computers and feel comfortable making necessary adjustments to hardware and software connections.

### Rush and Webster Public Libraries

received grants from the Arts and Cultural Council for Greater Rochester - only two libraries awarded these competitive grants more commonly given to arts groups. Webster Public will be using their grant for photography classes and a photo exhibition in the Fall. Rush Public will be using their money on a Community Art project focused on the Bicentennial Lewis and Clark Expedition.

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### Interpreting/Deaf Studies Index Online

Finally, there is an index that focuses on Interpreting and Deaf Studies. For those of us who have tried to do research on interpreting, interpreting situations, what is happening in the field of interpreting, and what is happening in the field of Deaf Studies, we know that it's been difficult to find anywhere that has indexed periodicals in these subject areas. Now there is a current index that focuses on these topics.

**National Technical Institute for the Deaf (NTID)** has quite a collection of periodicals, proceedings, and newsletters that focus on these areas. Here is an index that has taken some of these, put them in a searchable format, and put them on the web. This index does not have full text, but you can search by author, title, subject, or words that appear in these fields. This index is in the development stage and will be changing and growing, but there is a lot of good information available at this time. Please, take a look and see what you can find.

RRLC's new Reference Interest Group had its initial meeting on April 10, with attendees representing a wide variety of libraries and an equally wide variety of issues and interests. The second meeting on May 16 focused on a discussion of reference collection development, particularly in the area of electronic resources. Participants in this lively group brought samples of surveys and use studies for comment and discussion.

The group will continue to meet somewhat regularly with a variety of meeting formats, including roundtable discussions, presentations, and visits to member libraries. All those present agreed that the opportunity for reference librarians and staff to meet and exchange ideas is very helpful. The group is coordinated by Charlie Cowling, Head of Reference at SUNY Brockport.

RRLCREF-L was created to provide an easy means for discussion and for expediting communication among reference librarians in all types and sizes of libraries in the greater Rochester region. The list may be used by reference staff to ask questions of one another and to discuss topics of interest and concern to those working in reference. 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## Interlibrary Loan Statistics Up, Statistics Down



Reflecting a trend that is occurring in libraries across the country, RRLC has recorded a decrease in interlibrary loan activity for the year 2001. Member libraries borrowed a total of 1.7% fewer items than in the previous year, and loaned 4% fewer items than in the year 2000. Does this indicate a decrease in library activity for the year 2001? Absolutely not, according to RRLC members who were asked to comment on the changes in their statistics. The corresponding increases in the use of online, remotely accessible, full text databases show that people are using their libraries more than ever! Li-

brary users are accessing information in different ways and taking advantage of the wealth of information available to them without having to leave home (or work, or their campus residence hall). Our two public library systems (Monroe County Library System and Pioneer Library System) had an overall increase in interlibrary loan activity during 2001, as did our private academic libraries. The most significant drop in interlibrary loan was among the health care libraries, where health care professionals have access to timely information in a growing array of full text databases via the MiracleNet network.

## No New Money

There is no new money to support these and other critical library services. These services are supported through state funds, and those state funds have not increased since 1998 – and even that was a delayed increase first passed in 1990.

Library supporters have sent thousands of letters and postcards to legislators and the Governor asking for more State aid for libraries. Library use is up, especially since September 11<sup>th</sup>. Still our elected officials could find no new money for libraries, although many other projects that benefit fewer people were funded.

People know that libraries are an *investment*. If 70% of registered voters are using the library, there must be a reason. Those voters recognize what libraries offer — information to help them improve and enhance their lives — learn more, get a better job, care for a sick relative, help their children grow. Why can't our elected officials recognize this also?

Resumes also may be updated at any time throughout the year.
