You may have heard about the recent V.I.P. pass program from the **Monroe County Library System**. The program was developed by a participant of last year's Library Marketing Institute who was able to take her idea and turn it into a partnership program by using the skills and tools she developed during the Institute, including her marketing plan.

NY3Rs Cooperative Services Agreement Delivery High Priority

A statewide delivery service is a high priority for many of our members -- especially those participating in Connect NY and the IDS Project. The NY3Rs has listened to our members and has made solving of this issue its highest priority for the newly enhanced cooperative agreement among the NY3Rs. The Delivery Task Force (see below) has hired a consultant to work with representatives of NY3Rs, IDS, ConnectNY and the State Library to ensure that a replacement for LAND is in place and operating by July 1, 2012.

NY3Rs, which incorporated as NY3Rs, Inc. several years ago already has two major ongoing statewide projects -- Ask Us 24/7 and NYHeritage.org.

The nine NY3Rs have created four task groups to investigate issues our members deemed important. They are, and a brief synopsis of developments to date:

- Continuing Education -- looking into webinars that will be open to any member of any NY3Rs; sharing funding to bring in nationally recognized experts. Testing various webinar platforms.
- E-resources -- agreement with Lyris to allow NY3Rs members to get discounted pricing on e-resources without joining Lyris; Lexis-Nexis pricing for NY3Rs members; will be investigating shared e-book collections, especially for academic libraries.
- Procurement -- investigating procurement issues in NYS for public entities, especially SUNY and CUNY libraries; determining extent of problems and determining if actions can be taken to ease the path for purchases if necessary.
- Statewide delivery -- working with State Library on a replacement for LAND delivery service; separately, investigating options for replacement of LAND that would meet needs of current users; future investigation may include libraries and systems beyond current LAND members.

Work continues on Ask Us 24/7 as well as NYHeritage. As an example, NYHeritage is working on a backup system for TIF (archival) images and is also working with consultants to provide educational materials and guidelines on best practices for preserving the TIF images and metadata at the institutional level.

Libraries are encouraged to contact their Council if they have additional "projects" or "issues" that might benefit from NY3Rs investigation and/or coordination.



Rochester Public Library 100th Anniversary Book

Enjoy this decade by decade pictorial history of **Rochester Public Library's century of service from 1911-2011**. Featuring interior and exterior pictures of most city library branches, past and present, as well as the development of the Central Library over its earliest site to its present location. Complete with index and over 250 photographs, this volume tells the library story of varied public services and changing technologies. Especially remarkable are the 1930's photographs showing the construction of the Rundel Memorial Building over the old subway and Erie Canal spillway. Included are notable Rochesterians important to Rochester Public Library's history. Photographs chosen also illustrate the changing evolution of the city itself.

This book is dedicated to Harold Hacker and was compiled by Rochester Public Library retirees, **Barbara Billingsley, Maureen Whalen, Paula Smith, Sue Bovay, Judy Prevratil** and Kodak retiree, **Steve Shanker**, who scanned and prepped the images.

St. John Fisher College Receives \$200,000 for New Learning Commons in Lavery Library

St. John Fisher College has received a \$200,000 grant from the **Booth Ferris Foundation** that will be used to construct a new Learning Commons in Lavery Library.

A joint effort led by the College's library, Office of Information Technology, and Academic Affairs Department, the Learning Commons will serve as a one-stop-shop for learning, writing, research, pedagogy, and technology support for the Fisher community. Approximately 3,000 square feet, the Learning Commons will be located in the main floor of the library.

"This grant will enable us to create a central learning space where students, faculty, and staff will have access to resources and assistance to learn new skills and work collaboratively on many types of projects," said **Melissa Jadlos, Director, St. John Fisher College Lavery Library**.

Fisher students currently have access to the tutoring services of the Math and Writing Centers on campus, but according to Jadlos, the Learning Commons takes that support system to a new level by centralizing services at the library.

The new space will allow for more informal work and social interaction among students, faculty, and staff. Workstations, print stations, and a training room are some of the features, and a variety of support services will be offered for both undergraduate and graduate students. Programs will include workshops on exam preparation, digital literacy, effective group work, critical reading skills, research methodologies, and presentation skills. Students will also have access to one-on-one consultation for computing support, math and writing assistance, and research assistance.

Lavery Librarians Team Up with Faculty to Win National Innovation Award



A team of **St. John Fisher College** librarians and faculty was recently named a winner in the **2011 Association of College Research and Libraries President's Program Innovation Contest**. Winners were announced at the 2011 American Library Association (ALA) Annual Conference in New Orleans. A total of 28 proposals were submitted, and the Fisher team won the "implemented" category for their project, "3-Hour School Library Field Experience for Pre-Service K-12 Teachers."

The Fisher team was led by **Kathi Sigler, Education Librarian at Lavery Library**, and also included: **Melissa Jadlos, Library Director; Dr. Wendy Paterson, Dean of the Ralph C. Wilson, Jr. School of Education; Allison Bosworth, Director of Field Experiences and Student Teaching, School of Education; Joellen Maples, Assistant Professor, School of Education; and Sharon Christman, Visiting Instructor, School of Education**. In addition, the team collaborated with approximately 100 local K-12 School Library Media Specialists.

The team created a requirement for every K-12 pre-service teacher enrolled in the School of Education to spend three hours of field experience in a school library. Fisher students and local K-12 school librarians were paired into teams. During the field experience, the students observed how the school librarian collaborated with the classroom teachers in the school where they were assigned. They also had an opportunity to ask questions about library resources for lesson planning, and maximizing the school librarian as a resource.

The project was sparked by the idea that newly hired K-12 teachers are often so busy, they never connect with the school librarian. The preparation afforded the students an opportunity to experience the value of teacher and school librarian collaboration, a crucial partnership for their own students' educational experience.

The ALA committee noted that the Fisher team's project was "a great example of interdepartmental collaboration that impressed the committee with its innovative qualities."

University of Rochester River Campus Libraries

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Deans & Directors Gather To Think About the Future of Library Education

Every field is changing, and librarianship is no different. Libraries face increasing competition from commercial sources like Google and Netflix. Expectations of library users are changing also. Gaming; e-books and downloadable and streaming media; ESL; community centers; learning commons; information veracity; ethnic diversity; public/private partnerships; new funding strategies – and much more – all are part of the road-map to the library of the future that 2020 patrons will demand.

Library directors are often heard to comment that today's library and information science graduates do not have the skills that are needed in today's libraries. This concern, however, is not new. LIS educators and LIS professionals know that there has long been a difference of opinion on:

Theory v. Practice
Professional Foundation v. Specialized Skills/Training
Discipline Knowledge v. Applied (i.e. workplace) Knowledge

What is the desired balance between these two sides and how can it be achieved? Finding the answer to this problem is increasingly important because of the rapid changes occurring in today's libraries.

Deans and representatives from New York's seven library schools and directors from all types of libraries from across the state, participated this past May in Albany for a one day NYLA-sponsored retreat "**Looking to Our Future: Librarians for 2020 Libraries**". Participants looked at the future of libraries and tried to envision what library skills will be needed. Local participants were: **Shirley Bower (RIT), Glen Huot (BOCES #1 SLS), Kathy Miller (RRLC) and Wendy Patterson (Dean of School of Education, St. John Fisher College).**

What are the positive characteristics of today's library school grads? *Passion, fearlessness, energetic, adaptable, creative, innovative, tech savvy, they give honest feedback.*

And what are the skills needed now and in the future that many grads don't have? *Marketing, business acumen, project planning, pedagogical skills, social work skills, public speaking.*

All agreed that when job applicants are asked "why did you decide to become a librarian?" too many answer "I love to read." Participants agreed they love to read too, but what they want are learners not readers.

What were the some of the results of the retreat?

- More coordination and collaboration between library schools and libraries. Library school students should be encouraged to volunteer in libraries to understand the breadth and depth of what libraries do.
- Greater introduction early on in library education about the many different roles librarians play and the different settings they may work in.
- "Service Learning" should be tried by the library schools. This model, used by many fields including medicine, provides community service combined with reflection and classroom study. It requires less staff time of the host library than student internships and can provide a more in depth understanding of the "real" world of librarianship.

- Help for students transitioning from school to the workplace. Many end up in positions totally different to what they prepared for, and both the library schools and the library community need to help.

As library educators and library professionals, we know that ultimately the success of libraries depends upon us and our ability to fashion an education path that provides a foundation yet can react quickly to these changes. NYLA will continue to work with this issue. There will be an update prior to the NYLA Conference in November.

Geneva Newspapers Online

One hundred years of Geneva newspapers have been added to RRLC's Historical Newspapers of the Rochester, NY Region. The microfilm for the newspapers is held by the Geneva Historical Society which sent it to our partner, the Northern New York Library Network, for digitizing. The digitizing is possible because of funding from RRLC's Regional Bibliographic Data Bases and Resource Sharing program, funded by the NYS Education Department, Division of Library Development.



Geneva papers include the Geneva Expositor from 1806 all the way through the Geneva Advertiser in 1914. There are a few breaks in the papers (many papers, many title changes) which we will work to fill in. (If you have microfilm of any of the missing years, please let us know!)

Brockport historical newspapers are now being digitized and will soon be up on the website also. The website is hugely popular: more than 36,000 visitors and more than 1/3 million hits since January 2011 – and that's only for the Fairport newspapers.

Local History Reference Works Digitized

Two groups of local history reference works, original published from 1978 to 1997 in seven separate volumes are now available as databases on the Internet. Most were originally published by the former Local History Committee of the Rochester Regional Library Council.

The first is The Genesee Region, 1790 to the Present, A Guide to its History (1978) and its two supplements (1984 and 1992). This is a bibliography of books, pamphlets and periodical articles on the history of a ten-county area of upstate New York. Rochester is the largest community in the area. Most of the 6917 entries in the bibliography are briefly annotated. The database allows various search strategies not available in the printed volumes.

The digitized version has been entered in OCLC under the title: Bibliography of the Genesee Region 1790-1990. Any OCLC member library can download the entry with its live link to the database to its own catalog.

The 1978 and 1984 volumes in the Bibliography of the Genesee Region database were compiled by James D. Folts, who is now Head of Researcher Services at the New York State Archives, Albany. The 1992 volume was compiled by Karl S. Kabe-lac, now retired from Rush Rhees Library, The University of Rochester.

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Roberts Wesleyan College Golisano Library

The Golisano Library is pleased to welcome **Lynn Brown** as the library's first **Director of Library Digital Services and Systems**. Lynn has assumed responsibility for the smooth operation of our Library Information System, electronic resource management, webpage and building technologies. She began working on July 28 and brings valuable systems experience to the team.

Lynn has been the Media Specialist for School 52 in the Rochester City School District for the past four years. She is a second-career librarian, having worked for nearly fifteen years in the computer field in such capacities as systems analyst, programmer analyst, business analyst, project manager, and computer consultant. Her undergraduate degree in Computer Science/Business Management is from SUNY Fredonia, and her Master of Science in Library and Information Science is from Syracuse University.

Literacy Theme for RRLC Continuing Education Programs

As we begin a new academic year, we also begin a new year of **Continuing Education at RRLC**. The fall lineup of classes includes a variety of topics, ranging from **Project Management**, to **CPR and First Aid**, to **Resource Description and Access**. RRLC members will also notice multiple classes on the topic of literacy. As a result of discussion by the Planning Committee and suggestions from members, RRLC will adopt a theme for Continuing Education for the year.

This year's theme is Literacy. Literacy is a wide-ranging topic that touches all libraries and library users. We are thinking beyond traditional literacy, exploring the different competencies that our library users will need to succeed in school, work, and in their personal lives. We currently have three classes on Literacy scheduled for the fall: **Media Literacy, Visual Literacy, and Primary Source Literacy**. We have received many other suggestions for types of literacy that impact your libraries and library users - but please keep the suggestions coming. Send your suggestions, thoughts, and requests for literacy training to Laura Osterhout (losterhout@rrlc.org). There is still space in our fall training calendar for workshops to be added.

The RRLC Information Literacy Continuum Committee will be working this year to support this year's theme of literacy. The committee, comprised of RRLC member librarians representing academic, high school and public libraries, will offer suggestions on CE programming, roundtables about topics relating to literacy and the librarian's role as a facilitator of the Common Core Standards.

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Local History Reference Works Digitized

The second is a group of four indexes to subjects in various books relating to Rochester and Monroe County. The database is [Rochester Local History Indexes: Search](#).

The first index (1986) covered views, indexing about 60 titles with about 5,000 entries; the second (1992) covered pictures of individuals, indexing 53 titles with about 7,500 entries; the third (1995) was late 19th centuries businesses, indexing 11 titles with about 2,000 entries; and the fourth (1997) was biographical sketches, indexing nearly 70 titles with about 12,200 entries.

The database has been entered in OCLC under the title: [Rochester Local History Indexes](#). Again, an OCLC member library can download the entry with its live link to the database to its own catalog.

The images volume (1986) in the [Rochester Local History Indexes](#) database was compiled by members of the Rochester Regional Library Council's Local History Committee and edited by Karl S. Kabelac. He compiled the other three indexes in the database.

The digital conversion of these titles was done by Melissa S. Mead, director of the Digital Projects Research Center, Rush Rhees Library, The University of Rochester.
